## EAST ASIAN LIBRARY RESOURCES IN AMERICA: A NEW SURVEY

The development of East Asian collections in American libraries during the last decade was exceedingly impressive. A recent survey by the AAS Committee on East Asian Libraries of the acquisitions, fiscal support and personnel of the East Asian collections in the United States and Canada (and one in Latin America) indicates that the total number of both individual collections and volumes of resources at the end of the fiscal year of 1969/70 has doubled that of a decade ago. The current holdings in Chinese, Japanese, Korean, and other East Asian languages have reached a total of over five million volumes located in more than seventy different collections, half of which were established in the 1960's. This means the acquisitions made during the last decade (1960-70) equaled the total number of volumes accumulated over the last hundred years before 1960 and as many new collections have been established since then as those founded before that date. The year 1959-60 was the beginning of massive support for Asian and other area studies in the United States from the federal government, private foundations, and universities and institutions, thus resulting in the rapid growth of non-Western language resources in American libraries.

Of the total holdings as reported by 71 collections at the end of June, 1970, 3.3 million volumes (60%) are in Chinese, 1.9 million (33%) in Japanese, 140,000 (3%) in Korean, 120,000 (2.5%) in Manchu, Mongolian, Tibetan, Moso and Hsi-hsia, and 56,000 reels (1.5%) in microform in various languages (See Table 1). The average annual increase during the last four years (1966-70) was 300,000 volumes, which is 50% higher than that for 1960-66, and double that for 1956-60. Most of the collections acquired a few thousand volumes each year, but ten of them each added between 10,000 and 23,000 volumes in 1969-70. Over 60% of the new additions were made to the 15 major collections with holdings of over 100,000 volumes, which contain some 4 million volumes or 80% of the total resources in 1970. The growth of

library resources in the East Asian collections indicates a trend toward doubling the total size every ten years since 1930. The total holdings in 1930 were about 400,000 volumes, which have doubled successively at the end of each of the new four decades, reaching a total of 5.4 million volumes today (See Table 2).

At present, 57 collections reported to have maintained a staff of 409 persons, expressed in terms of full time, for the acquisition, preparation, and servicing of the materials. These include 226 professionals, who were trained in library schools or in Far Eastern studies and 183 pre-professional or clerical members, who are supervised under professionals in supporting the administration, processing, circulation, and maintenance of the collections. These figures may be compared with a working force in 1964 of 250 persons, including 160 professionals, an addition of two-thirds of the personnel in 1970 to that of six years ago.

A total of over 35 million dollars was invested in the development and maintenance of the East Asian libraries during the last decades since 1959-60. For the year 1969-70 alone, the total expenditures were 5.2 million dollars, including almost 2 million for the materials, binding, and supplies (37%) and 3.2 million (63%) for acquisitions, preparation, and services. In comparison with those five years ago, the expenditures for 1969-70 were doubled, but the ratio 1:2 between materials and salaries remains about the same. About 90% of the money came from the collections' parent institutions or universities, 7% from foundations and endowments. and 3% from NDEA funds (See Table 3). These figures indicate a substantial increase in institutional support but gradual decline of foundation and federal funds from those of five years ago. The total budget for 1970-71 shows about the same as the expenditures for the previous year, but a general trend of curtailment in acquisitions was reported by most of the collections for the current year. The total book budget dropped almost 20%, while the salary shows a 6% gain as a result of the normal adjustment in salaries. The expansion of the collections seems to have reached the top of the curve in the last few years and the downward turn of the line is hoped to be temporary as a result of adjustment in support of Asian and other foreign area studies in this country.
